PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

As of this time, we are down 25 members in traditional club membership. Due to the continuing pandemic accompanied by the Stay at Home order by the Governor, our club rebuilding and building efforts are on an indefinite hold. There are 3 paid members of the York rebuild and at least 2 more solid prospects waiting to be able to meet again. The Gloucester Club build is also continuing to look for potential members in spite of the current hardship. I stated in the last Bulletin that last year the Virginia District had 18 of the 19 Clubs win the National Service Award. We currently have 11 of our Clubs that have won the NSA. As a reminder, this information is used by National to apply for grants or other monetary awards nationally. It is generally an online postcard for most clubs and there is not a penalty for filing late. (**Be advised that failure to file the 990 for three consecutive years will result in forfeiture of your club non-profit status by IRS**). Please submit a copy of the 990 to both District Treasurer Jim Puckett (cvc73@aol.com) and National (finance@nationalexchangeclub.org). The deadlines for the All-American Volunteer, ACE Award, and Youth of the Year awards are due soon. Please get these submitted to the proper Committee Chair.

The District Convention will be held June 6, 2020 by way of a Zoom meeting. The details are included in this newsletter. I hope many of you will take advantage of this opportunity to be able to stay at home and still participate in our Convention. We will be presenting several awards, installing new District Officers and Division Directors, and have updates from National.

History of the National Exchange Club - What do we Exchange?

The first Exchange Club was founded in Detroit, Michigan, on March 27, 1911, by Charles A. Berkey and twelve of his friends and business associates. Prior to the official formation of the club, some of these men had been meeting informally during lunch as far back as 1896. The second Exchange Club was formed on January 3, 1913 in Toledo, Ohio. Later, Exchange Clubs were formed in Cleveland, Ohio, and Grand Rapids, Michigan. These four Exchange Clubs were the first to be chartered by The National Exchange Club. Through the years, what started as a single club of businessmen has grown into a national organization of hundreds of clubs throughout the United States and Puerto Rico with thousands of members, including men, women and students from all walks of life. The National Exchange Club Headquarters is in Toledo, Ohio.

Exchange continues to be guided by its founding principle, that members should exchange ideas and collaborate to make communities better places to live. The motto is Unity for Service. The National Project is the Prevention of Child Abuse, adopted in 1979 at the urging of Dr. Edward North, Jr. Today, National Headquarters and local clubs support a variety of activities that are designed to educate and inform the public, including Exchange Child Abuse Prevention Centers. Exchange Programs of Service are Americanism, Community Service and Youth. Through the decades, Exchange has met the challenges of the times by supporting aviation in the 1920s, the Recovery Crusade following the Great Depression as requested by President Franklin Roosevelt in the 1930s, focusing on Crime Prevention in the 1940s, and advocating for the addition of "One Nation Under God" to the Pledge of Allegiance in the 1950s.

Exchange Club meetings always begin with a prayer and the Pledge of Allegiance and always end with reciting The Exchange Club Covenant of Service. The Covenant of Service was officially adopted by The National Exchange Club as the philosophy which characterizes the individual Exchangite.

Many years ago, it was also customary to allocate a portion of each meeting, preferably near the beginning, to singing. It was believed that singing developed "a spirit of congeniality and good fellowship" and it was the genial atmosphere created by singing that contributed to "a good club". According to the guidelines, there was an official song leader, chosen not necessarily based on his ability to sing but his ability to put "zip" into the singing. The song leader was also forewarned not to use the same songs over and over as "such a practice would lead to monotony and loss of interest by the membership". The booklet, *Songs of the Exchange Club*, published by The National Exchange Headquarters, Toledo, Ohio, c1954, contains a variety of inspirational, patriotic, religious, silly and old favorite songs – the type songs most children of that era learned in elementary school, church, or youth camps. There are also nineteen (19) Exchange songs listed. Some were originals such as *Forward! Men of Exchange* by Edward E. Van Deursen, Detroit, Michigan; *E-X-C-H-A-N-G-E* by the Exchange Club Revelers of Denver and Exchange member, Al N. Berube; and *Unity of Service* by Professor E. J. Gatwood, Nashville, Tennessee. Others were songs with familiar tunes rewritten with "Exchange words"; some are serious, others hilariously funny.

People often ask: What do we Exchange? The word exchange means to swap, trade or barter. In the business world exchange is parting with something in return for its equivalent. A great answer to this question specific to The Exchange Club is "giving of self for the privilege in return of serving others;" as stated in "The Spirit of Exchange" in an early Exchange publication. Another way to say this, as stated in this same publication, paraphrases the Exchange Covenant of Service – "parting with selfishness and receiving in return the satisfaction of discharging our duty to our Fellowmen, to our Community and to our Nation."

Zoom Meetings and Etiquette

Zoom is a cloud-based platform for chats, webinars, video conferencing and audio communication. Once you have registered for the District Convention and provided an email address, a link will be emailed to you with the date and time of the meeting. This email will be coming from warrenmarie1957@gmail.com. All you need to do is click on the link in the email or copy and paste it into your web browser, allow the Zoom portal, and enter the meeting. Do you need a Zoom account to join a meeting?

No. A **Zoom** account isn't required to **attend a meeting**. Anyone **can join a meeting** using the **Zoom** mobile **apps** or desktop applications for Windows and Mac.

Can you use zoom on your phone?

If **you're** on **mobile**, **you can** go with **the Zoom** app available in Apple's App Store for iOS or Google Play for **Android** devices.

Etiquette during the meeting:

- •Only 1 person at a time can speak and be heard. Please Mute your microphone unless it is your turn to speak. This also helps keep down extraneous background noises. (pets/people/coughs, etc.)
- •Please use the CHAT feature to type in any questions or comments you may have. Include the person's name to whom you are asking the question or addressing the comment.
- •Remember that each participant on Zoom can see everything you are doing as you are in the meeting. If you need to walk away from your phone or computer, please click stop video and make sure you are muted. You will still be able to hear the speaker, but you will not be visible to everyone.


